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School District to Take Over Library

At a meeting of "the qualified electors" (note the quotation marks) of School District No. 11, held in the school house last Saturday evening, the vote of said "qualified electors" determined the fate of the public library. By a vote of 48 to 38 it was ruled that the library shall become the property of the School District and an appropriation not to exceed \$800 a year was voted for its maintenance. A board of five Trustees was elected to administer the conduct of the library consisting of the present three School Trustees supplemented by Miss Grace Parker and Frank J. Hutchinson.

The meeting was not without friction. In the first place A. H. Frique contended that the meeting was illegal, claiming that 13 of the persons who had signed the petition as qualified electors were not so qualified. So heated did the discussion become that District Superintendent Haight had difficulty in pouring oil upon the troubled waters, suggesting that the meeting proceed; that the question of eligibility might be taken up later.

So chairman George W. Green after ruling Mr. Frique out of order finally succeeded in getting a vote. Mr. Frique challenged the first vote cast, that of Frank A. Mahoney. Mr. Mahoney said he would refuse to swear in a vote, and was sustained by the chairman. After that incident the voting proceeded without further serious interruption.

Nevertheless there has been so much criticism of the conduct of the meeting, and so many varying opinions expressed about the legal qualifications of many of those who voted at this meeting that The Buzzer thinks the matter of sufficient importance to publish the names of all those who voted and thus publicly declared their legal right to do so. It seems that voters of Greenwood Lake District take their qualifications rather lightly.

How serious consequences may ensue is vividly shown by a recent Court Decision as reprinted below:

"Ernest Magnus Forsell, 38, who gave his address as 80 Pierce Place, Great Neck Plaza, L. I., was convicted at Mineola yesterday by a jury before County Judge Cortland A. Johnson of voting illegally at the Great Neck Plaza village election March 20, last. He was remanded to the county jail for sentence. The jury recommended leniency.

"It was alleged against Forsell that he cast a ballot at the election though he was a Swedish subject. He contended that he did not know it was wrong for him to vote, and that one inspector of elections told him to vote."

In view of recent votings in Greenwood Lake, the above should be of great interest to some persons who have voted.
