The Vestry wishes to make such a system of bearing the financial burden a permanent one, but are this year setting an unusually high objective because of certain urgent and extraordinary expenses in the form of repairs.

Purchasers receive a handsomely printed document as evidence of the number of "shares" they have taken for the year. In this manner it is hoped that the church will be maintained without fuss and with regularity.
