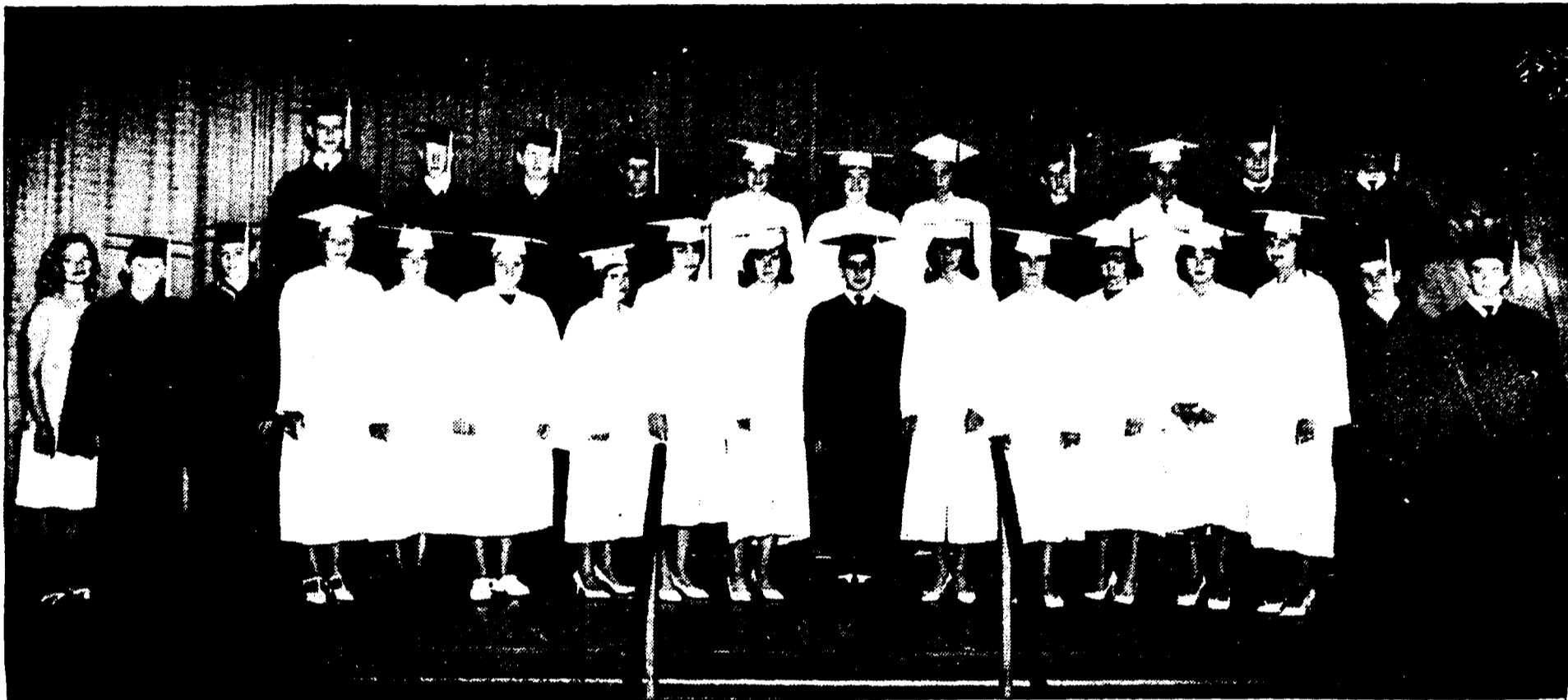

Hello Friends. . . This column is written especially for you. . . the folks who like to read about the "good old days" in Greenwood Lake. During the past 8 years of "Crackerbarrelin'" we've brought you the history of the Lake, along with side lights on the people and old landmarks. Now, all of the historical material of this area has been put together in a book by the official Village Historian and is in our Library. It's yours for the asking.

If there is any subject you are particularly interested in or any part of the history you would like repeated, just tell us. In the meantime. . . I see by the papers that the Buzzer is 59 years old and perhaps the oldest tabloid in New York State. Bess Conlin kindly gave us some old copies and these excerpts may interest you.

The students of the Graduating Class of our grammar school in June, 1944, were: Skippy Hart, Francis Lambert, Norman Dunn, Katherine Henry, Grace Rieve, Norma Carlson, Ruth Cosman, Mildred Willner, John and George Van Wormer.

Engagements announced on June 30, 1944 were: Dorothea Putman to Elmer Hunter. Doris Skinner to William Minturn; Alice Mabey to Lester Fredricks. (These fine couples are living

"happily ever afterwards".

General Lee's column, written by Arnold Lee in 1944 reads: "I saw "A" flivver go sailing by the other day and my suspicious were confirmed sure enough, there they were Marr and Hazen, two smiling ladies! So I knew that summer was here and it was time for my Buzzer jottings. I raced over to see "Pop" Muller to make arrangements for the annual dance sponsored by the Recreation Girls Drum Corps. "Pop" thought this was an occasion to celebrate and before I could catch my second wind, we were in Charlie Christ's place quenching our thirst. We told Charlie about the Dance and he donated \$25. He also agreed that if the Drum Corps could get a number of business men to donate the same, he would add an additional \$50. You can bet we are going to try and get that fifty bucks! The Dance is set for July 4, tickets \$1 and we have the "Sons of Swing" for you to dance by. Service men and women admitted free. See you at the dance! (Arnold Lee did some wonderful work for our Girls' Drum Corps and we were sorry when it disbanded. But a happy note is that one of our girls, Judge Sudman's daughter, Mrs. Richard Littell was instrumental in starting the Queen Village Queens. When the "Queens" in green and white uniforms marched down our main street on Decoration Day, it was a poignant reminder of days gone by.

Another little piece from the July 21, 1944 front page reads: "The Thoughts From Home Committee" will long be remembered in the hearts of all our Greenwood Lake service men, for their

magnificent work in sending gift boxes and letters that have brought encouragement and cheer. In addition the Warwick Dispatch and The Buzzer have been mailed weekly to the boys." (We know that many of you remember Mrs. James Ryerson (our Florence) the untiring and cheerful worker in this project. And those years we all met and packed the boxes that were sent once a month during the war years.)
